Did you know ...?

You'll find information about home cooling, weatherization, indoor and outdoor lighting, popular electronics, second refrigerators and pools. For example:

• Simple steps such as an annual checkup and clean filters for your central air conditioner can help you control cooling costs, typically \$120 per month during the hottest summer months.

- Weatherstripping and caulking around drafty doors and windows can help save up to 5% on cooling and heating costs.
- In a typical home with 45 standard lights, you could save up to \$500 per year by switching to energy-efficient lights.
- One 150-watt floodlight can cost you nearly \$125 a year, while

low-voltage replacements can produce the same amount of light and save you up to \$90 per year.

- Smart strips can help you save on costs such as the \$80-plus per year you may be spending to use vour DVR to record and watch vour favorite TV shows.
- A refrigerator that's more than 10 years old may be adding \$20 per month to your energy bill.
- An energy-efficient, variable-speed pool pump can save you more than \$300 per year in filtering costs.

As a dog owner, you can help prevent bite injuries by securely confining your pet behind a locked fence or door when we come to your house on service calls, such as appliance safety checkups. Spring-cleaning uncovers savings

The time-honored tradition of springcleaning can be a great way to freshen up your home and dust off some opportunities for saving energy and money. Here are a few tips to get you started.

- Clean door seals on your refrigerator, freezer and oven to prevent leaks. Replace damaged seals.
- Vacuum or dust the condenser coils of your refrigerator or freezer to prevent overheating.
- Adjust your smart thermostat program setting to reflect the time change.
- Replace disposable filters on your air conditioner or heat pump, or hose down permanent filters every month or two, as the manufacturer advises.
- Remove built-up lint and dust from the clothes dryer exhaust duct, the outside dryer exhaust terminal, the back of the dryer itself and *behind* the lint screen. This is in addition to cleaning the lint screen every time you use the dryer.
- Spray a detergent-and-water solution on the outside condenser coils of your air conditioner or heat pump and rinse to clean.

- Remove barriers such as furniture, weeds and debris that block airconditioning vents and equipment.
- Flush out built-up sediment from inside the tank of your water heater.
