As electric rates change, energy solutions can help you manage bills

ypically, your electric rates change three times a year based on the actual price of electricity.

By May, rates for the top two tiers of electricity use (Tiers 3-4) will rise, based on what we paid for electricity recently. One reason for rising costs is the increased amount of renewable energy, which is more expensive than traditional sources in the mix of energy we buy. The state has directed all utilities to obtain at least 33% of their electricity purchases

from renewable sources by 2020. In addition, the rate structure is changing as a result of California's electric rate reform law. Assembly Bill 327, which took effect Jan. 1, 2014, gives back to the California Public Utilities Commission the authority to bring rates in line with actual costs of electric service so everyone pays their fair share. It replaces the structure put in place after the 2001 energy crisis that shifted the majority of cost increases to high-use customers.

The first step, if approved, could begin July 1. We've proposed rate changes for all four tiers that would start the 2014-2018 transition to a redesigned rate structure gradually. Some of those tier prices would increase, while others would decrease.

"Right tree, right place" rooted in safe, reliable electric service

If you plan to plant trees this spring, be sure to take the "right tree, right place" approach. It means choosing trees that appeal to you and harmonize with overhead power lines and underground utilities for safe, reliable service.

- Start by checking out the tree planting guide under the "Resources" listed at left on our tree safety site at sdge.com/treesafety.
- At least two workdays before digging, call Underground Service Alert at 811 to have underground utility lines marked out. This service is free. Once you know where underground pipes and cables are located, you should dig carefully, using only hand tools, within 24 inches of utility equipment.
- If you're concerned about vegetation growing close to a power line or transformer, call us at **1-800-411-7343** to request an inspection. We work with local communities and licensed contractors to maintain 415,000 trees throughout our 4,100-squaremile service area. Don't trim trees near power lines yourself it's dangerous.
