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Winning ways pay off for 2012 Energy Champions

Alexandria Real Estate Equities

Inc. earned \$212,000 in SDG&E incentives toward upgrades that save 1.38 million kilowatt-hours

and 27,600 therms of natural gas per year at one of its 40 local properties. Guillermo Gomez, senior director of facility services, says energy efficiency is "the right thing to do."

The City of Chula Vista is saving

770,000 kWh and 18.800 therms annually, thanks to light-emitting diode (LED) street lights, variable-frequency drives (VFDs) and

other measures that qualified for \$303,000 in SDG&E incentives and 0% on-bill financing. Gordon Day, building project manager, cites the VFDs as "a great example of a lowcost improvement that has a short payback period."

The Hotel del Coronado added two

new projects to its long history of saving energy: digital HVAC guest room controls and lighting sensors.

Annual savings total Ray Stagg 1.619 million kWh and 17,000 therms. Incentives were \$163,000. Ray Stagg, director of facilities, says the hotel also saves money by participating in demand-response events "without disrupting the guest experience."

IKEA San Diego assembled a

liahting retrofit for its 198,000-squarefoot store, saving 815,000 kWh per year and earning \$75,600 in SDG&E rebates. IKEA

also installed three electric vehicle charging stations and rooftop photovoltaic panels. Brian Sims, facilities manager, says, "We've definitely noticed a significant reduction in energy use."

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Isis Pharmaceuticals earned

Savings By Design incentives of \$414.000 for designing its new 176,000-squarefoot headquarters to operate more

efficiently than state standards require, saving 2.337 million kWh and 143,500 therms per year. Grant Bryce, vice president of corporate development, likes how "SDG&E helps to determine what works best for a customer's specific needs."

Lemon Grove School District

replaced 2.570 lighting fixtures and installed six highly efficient servers that run as many computer operating systems as 110

servers used to do, saving 902,000 kWh per year and earning incentives of \$172,000. Ernie Anastos, district superintendent, says, "Energy efficiency is everyone's business ... a sustainable way to address our diminishing resources, whether financial or otherwise."

Qualcomm Inc. has tapped virtually

every applicable SDG&E energyefficiency program. Chiller retrofits are among recent upgrades, aided by \$648,000 in

Satisfying summer demand

Though June 20 marks the arrival of summer, there's no such thing as a summer vacation for the statewide power grid. California depends on reliable electricity around the clock. And according to the agency responsible for operating most of California's electric transmission system, this summer could be challenging in Southern California.

The California Independent System Operator (ISO) recently released its 2012 Summer Loads and Resources Assessment, plus an update on plans by the California ISO, SDG&E and others to address potential reliability challenges in San Diego, Orange County and the Los Angeles Basin. The California ISO cautions that if both San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station (SONGS) units remain offline this summer, San Diego and portions of the Los Angeles Basin may face local reliability challenges. Also, in case of adverse conditions such as extremely hot weather or a major loss of imported power, the California ISO emphasizes the need for energysaving efforts.
